Governor takes briefings of GAD and Handloom, Textile and Sericulture Department

Takes stock of e-file system

Guwahati, November 8: Assam Governor Gulab Chand Kataria in a meeting today at Raj Bhavan took stock of the General Administration Department (GAD) with special focus on digitization and transforming the entire state manual filing system into e-file.

Additional Chief Secretary of GAD Avinash Joshi presented to the Governor the initiatives of the department in making the bulk of the state administration digital, fast and flawless. Considering the demands of handloom products, the Governor asked the department to market the products aggressively in and outside the state. He stressed the potential of handloom and handicraft products to showcase the cultural heritage of the state. In recognition to exquisitely beautiful creative work undertaken by women Self Help Groups, the Governor asked the department to intensively arrange for high quality training for the weavers and artisans.

Moreover, the Governor advocated for establishing collaborative initiatives with both Central and State Khadi Bhawans to showcase and market the region's rich handloom and textile products across the country. Such a collaborative effort, he said would undoubtedly propel the department to attain national and international recognition. This would also promote the cultural heritage and economic prospects of Assam.
